Local Law No. ____ of 2023

(A LOCAL LAW TO AMEND TOWN CODE PROVISIONS WITH RESPECT TO ACCESSORY APARTMENTS)

Section 1. Legislative Intent

Pursuant to Section 194-91 of the Town Code, the Town already has provisions in place for the creation of accessory residential units in residential districts (Accessory Apartments). Most recently, the Supervisor and Town Board amended these provisions pursuant to Local law Number 7 of 2022. The way that Section 194-91 of the Town Code currently reads does not reflect the intent of the Town Board's most recent changes. The Supervisor and Town Board requested this Local Law to amend provisions to ensure that Accessory Apartments are sited in appropriate locations.

Section 2. Amendments to Town Code Section 194-91 for Accessory Residential Units in Residential Districts

Section 194-91 of the Town Code shall be amended to read as follows:

- A. Purpose.
- (1) The purpose of this section is to allow accessory apartments, on single-family properties in zoning districts where single-family dwellings are permitted, except where enforceable deed covenants prohibit the same, in order to provide the opportunity and encouragement for the development of small housing units designed, in particular, to meet the special housing needs of the community. Further, it is the purpose of this section to allow the more efficient use of the Town's stock of dwellings and accessory buildings; to provide economic support for resident families of limited income; to protect and preserve property values; and to preserve the character and appearance of single-family neighborhoods.
- (2) To achieve these goals, the following standards and conditions apply.
- B. Standards and conditions.
- (1) No more than one accessory apartment per lot may be permitted, nor shall the total number of dwelling units on any lot exceed two.
- (2) No accessory apartment may be permitted in a two-family or multifamily dwelling.
- (3) The owner of the lot upon which the accessory apartment is located shall occupy one of the dwelling units on the premises as his or her principal residence.
- (4) Dimensional requirements. The following regulations shall apply:
- (a) Attached accessory apartments within single-family dwellings:

- [1] Minimum size of accessory apartment: 400 square feet.
- [2] Maximum size of accessory apartment: 50% of the habitable floor space of the principal dwelling or 1,000 square feet, whichever is less.
- (b) Detached accessory apartments in accessory structures:
- [1] Minimum size of accessory apartment: 400 square feet.
- [2] Maximum size of accessory apartment: Not exceeding 50% of the size of the accessory structure.
- [3] Minimum side and rear yards: as required for the principal dwelling.
- (5) Exterior appearance. If an accessory apartment is located in the principal dwelling, the entry to such unit and its design shall be such that, to the degree reasonably feasible, the appearance of the building will remain as a single-family residence. In cases where alterations are to be made to accommodate the accessory apartment, elevation drawings may be required to be submitted with the application for a special permit.
- (6) Off-street parking. Off-street parking shall be provided in conformance with the requirements of the off-street parking schedule in Chapter 194 of the Town Code.
- (7) There shall be no renting of rooms in either the accessory apartment or in the principal dwelling.
- (8) Sale or subdivision. Neither an accessory apartment nor the premises upon which such accessory apartment is located shall be sold, converted into cooperative or condominium ownership, or subdivided, unless such action is accomplished in full compliance with the codes and ordinances of the Town of East Fishkill, Dutchess County, and the laws of the State of New York.
- (9) The accessory apartment shall meet the standards of the New York State Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code for habitable space.
- (10) The applicant shall comply with all applicable requirements of the Dutchess County Health Department.
- (11) No expansion of the footprint of any structure by more than 100 square feet will be permitted to allow an Accessory Apartment.
- C. Procedure.
- (1) Review by the Building Department:

- (a) No permit from the Building Department for an attached accessory apartment within a single-family dwelling shall be issued unless five years have elapsed from the date of issuance of a certificate of occupancy or certificate of compliance for the dwelling.
- (b) No permit from the Building Department for a detached accessory apartment within an accessory structure shall be issued unless five years have elapsed from the date of issuance of a certificate of occupancy or certificate of compliance for the accessory structure.
- (2) The issued permit does not automatically transfer to new owners. Subsequent owners shall apply to the Building Inspector for a permit renewal. The Building Inspector shall issue the permit if the accessory apartment is in compliance with this chapter and the NYS Uniform Fire Prevention and Building Code. The Building Inspector shall provide notice to adjacent property owners 30 days prior to renewing the permit.

Section 3. Severability

If any clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this Local Law or the application thereof to any person, firm or corporation, or circumstance, shall be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unconstitutional, such order or judgment shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder thereof, but shall be confined in its operation to the clause, sentence, paragraph, subdivision, or part of this Local Law or in its application to the person, individual, firm or corporation or circumstance, directly involved in the controversy in which such judgment or order shall be rendered.

Section 4. Effective date

This local law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

WHEREAS, a Full Environmental Assessment Form (FEAF) Part 1 was filed with the Town of East Fishkill Town Board ("Town Board") as required by 6 NYCRR §617.6(a)(2) to initiate the State Environmental Review Act (SEQRA) for the proposed project; and the Town Board identified the project as an Unlisted Action; and

The improvements will be installed within the shoulders of existing roadways and within previously disturbed areas. A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING, SUBJECT TO PERMISSIVE REFERENDUM, THE PURCHASE OF UPGRADING, AND IMPROVING PIPES, PUMPS, WELLS, AND APPERTANCES IN THE TOWN OF EAST FISHKILL, DUTCHESS COUNTY, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$16,728,196., AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$16,728,196 BONDS OF SAID TOWN TO PAY THE COST THEREOF.

WHEREAS, the capital project hereinafter described, as proposed, has been determined to be an Unlisted Action pursuant to the regulations of the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation promulgated pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act and Findings Statement will not have a significant adverse effect on the environment; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to authorize such capital project and its financing:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of East Fishkill, Dutchess County, New York as follows:

Section 1. The purchase and installation of Pipes, Pumps, and Appetences each item of which costs \$30,000 or over, for the Town of East Fishkill, Dutchess County, New York, including incidental equipment and expenses in connection therewith, is hereby authorized, subject to permissive referendum, at a maximum estimated cost of \$16,728,196.

<u>Section 2. The plan for the financing of the aforesaid maximum estimated cost is by</u> the issuance of \$16,728,196. bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued therefor pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is thirty years, pursuant to subdivision 28 of paragraph of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Town of East Fishkill, Dutchess County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year unless paid from other revenues. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property of said Town, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor of said Town, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. All other matters except as provided herein relating to the bonds herein authorized including the date, denominations, maturities and interest payment dates, within the limitations prescribed herein and the manner of execution of the same, including the consolidation with other issues, and also the ability to issue bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, shall be determined by the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer of such Town. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 51.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the Supervisor shall determine consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 7. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- (1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or
- (2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication this resolution are not substantially complied with, and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

(3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.
