REGULAR BOARD MEETING

The Town of East Fishkill's Town Board Meeting on June 27, 2024, was called to order at 6:00 p.m. by Supervisor D'Alessandro with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Supervisor's Presentation:

Supervisor D'Alessandro made a presentation to the Salutatorian of John Jay High School, Jacob Leobandung. A proclamation was given to him. When the Valedictorian arrived Naflah Mohammed, a proclamation was presented to her.

Supervisor's Announcements:

Supervisor D'Alessandro stated last month was the Memorial Day celebration. It was led by the Manny Bacon American Legion Post indoors at the Community Center due to the weather. He thanked everyone who attended. It is important to pay respects to those who serve our country and have paid the ultimate sacrifice. The Supervisor attended the Dutchess County Regional Chamber of Commerce monthly contact breakfast. It was in Poughkeepsie and the guest speakers were Congressman Michael Lawler and Congressman Pat Ryan. They gave an update of their activities in Washington.

Congressman Lawlor held a press conference in East Fishkill last Monday. County Executive Sue Serino, Senator Rob Rolison, New York State Assemblyman AJ Beephan, Supervisor Schmidt from the Town of Pawling, County legislator Chris Rolison, Councilman Franco and Councilman Marinaro all attended as well. He did present two checks for two projects. One of them is \$2 million for the mitigation of PFOS and PFOA contamination in the Pinewood Water District. Without this funding the Town could not do this project because the cost to the residents of such a small water district is prohibitive. The other \$2 million is for the water district in iPark.

Supervisor D'Alessandro stated he attended the monthly Association of Mayors and Supervisors meeting in Wappinger. The guest speaker this month was vice president of the Hudson Valley Regional Council. They assist in many initiatives such as economic development, clean air, water issues, energy, applications for local governments to name a few. They are very helpful with grant submissions as well.

There was a zoom meeting this month called Wake-up New York. It is a bi-monthly series hosted by the Empire Center. It is discussions by local

governmental officials and a platform for idea sharing, different marketing solutions, and other things at the local level. June focused on government transparency, which is very critical.

There was a Comprehensive Master Plan meeting at the senior center this past month. The Town is in the midst of redoing their Comprehensive Master Plan. They need to incorporate the thoughts and ideas from the senior community as well. The Town Planner gave a presentation and allowed for a Q&A session. He thanked everyone for their help on this.

There have been several meetings with New York State Economic State Development about a potential project at iPark. It is called the Hudson Valley Fastfab. They have submitted their application to the federal government for the Chips Act. This deals with semiconductors. They are looking to relocate to the former IBM East complex as there is a building there that still houses a clean room. They will be looking for three buildings in total. It will be approximately 165,000 ft² of clean room, 25,000 ft² for classified production, 15,000 ft² of laboratory space, 100,000 ft² of office and 30,000 ft² of warehouse for industrial space. They will build node sensors for transportation and automotive industry. They estimate more than 2200 permanent jobs. It will be a full union shop with many benefits. They're looking towards January 2025 with the first 65,000 ft² of clean room space, office space, and lab industrial space. Their initial costs for their first phase is \$1.3 billion. Building out to the total three buildings would be an investment of \$4 billion in our community. We have all the infrastructure in place for this type of industry already.

There was a meeting with Kristine Coulter from the Southern Dutchess News regarding the facility in front of the Amazon building on Route 52. Stellantis, the parent company of Chrysler, is proposed to be completed and operating the fourth quarter of 2024 or the first quarter of 2025. They will have between 100 and 150 full-time jobs. These jobs are all part of the United Auto Workers Union. Their base pay will start at over \$40.00 per hour according to the new Union Contract. Yesterday was a meeting with the Dutchess County Transportation Council to review the transportation plan, work plan, and five-year capital plan. They help fund the Transportation Improvement Program, which East Fishkill has taken advantage of in the past.

There is a resolution to set a Public Hearing for a Townwide Building Moratorium. This is for several reasons. The main reason is that they are in the midst of the Master Plan planning. This will help to indicate where and how much development should be occurring, not only in industrial areas but in residential as well. An application came forward for here across the street from the Town Hall right before the creek called Twin Creeks. This project was granted approvals back in 1980 for 468 units. They have done nothing for 44 years and now have come forward and they want their approvals back and they want to start building. The Town is not the same place that it was 44 years ago, so they need to take a hard look at this project. This is being passed through legal to find out exactly what the applicant's rights still are and the Town is watching it and will let the public know what is going on as they find out more information.

Courtesy of the Floor:

Supervisor D'Alessandro asked if there was anyone who wanted to speak about any general town issues.

Liz Seri stated she is a resident of East Fishkill. At the end of April her group, New York Citizens Audit had come forward and presented a resolution suggestion to the Board for the 2024 election. She was asking if there were any updates or feedback on that. Supervisor D'Alessandro stated that they did do a receipt and file for this application. He requested that the Town Clerk e-mail her a copy of the receipt.

Announcement of Additions to the Agenda:

Supervisor D'Alessandro said there are no additions to the agenda.

Receive and File:

Supervisor D'Alessandro stated the following items have been received: NYS DOT Highway Designation of Restricted Highway Contracts. Information has been

sent on restrictions on Route 84 in East Fishkill and a very small segment of 9D. Attorney Wood stated the DOT has an error because the section of 9D they are referring to is in Fishkill, not East Fishkill. There are also zoning referrals from the Town of Wappinger, the Town of Kent Notice, and the Town of LaGrange Notice of Public Hearing. Attorney Wood stated that any time there is a proposed action in an adjoining town, or anything within 500 feet of the town boundary, the municipality gives notice to the adjoining municipality in case there are any comments. Supervisor D'Alessandro stated all this information is posted on the website.

RESOLUTION

(SETTING PUBLIC HEARING FOR TOWN-WIDE MORATORIUM)

WHEREAS, the Town Board appointed a citizens committee to review the Town Master Plan which was last updated in 2002; and

WHEREAS, the committee is on target to deliver a draft Master Plan by the end of the year when the Planning Board and Town Board will begin the formal review and adoption process with a proposed completion in the first part of 2025; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board is concerned applications may be filed ahead of the new plan that could be inconsistent; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board will hold a Public Hearing on August 22, 2024 to consider imposing a Moratorium on certain development within the Town for a period of 9 months.

Motion to set a Public Hearing for August 22, 2024, to consider a moratorium until the Master Plan is completed: Board Member Franco. Seconded: Board Member Flores. All voted in favor. Motion carried.

3. Approve Contract with Mental Health America for Mental Health Services

(AUTHORIZING CONTRACT WITH MENTAL HEALTH AMERICA)

WHEREAS, over the last few years there has been a significant increase in calls to the Police for assistance with emotionally distressed persons; and

WHEREAS, even when it is determined no violence is eminent the Police must remain sometimes on the site for a substantial period of time; and

WHEREAS, even though the Police have been trained to handle mental health situations often times more detailed training and skills are needed; and

WHEREAS, Mental Health America assists the Police Departments in the County by providing greater services and follow up in these situations; and

WHEREAS, the communities utilizing these services have had greater success in preventing repeated calls thus eliminating Police involvement as well as overtime, etc.; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Supervisor be and hereby is authorized to retain Mental Health America, as a professional service and authorize said 2024 agreement.

WHEREAS, the Highway Superintendent has submitted a memo to the Town Board recommending that Leobardo Lopez be hired as a full-time MEO; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board does hereby authorize the hiring of Leobardo Lopez as a full-time MEO in the Highway Department; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Leobardo Lopez will be paid at an hourly rate of \$24.51 in accordance with the CSEA contract, with an effective date of June 30, 2024.

WHEREAS, Tyler Winters has been interviewed and recommended to the Town Board to be hired as a full-time Clerk; and

WHEREAS, Tyler Winters will be hired provisionally until it is verified that he is reachable on the Clerk Civil Service list; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board does hereby authorize the provisional hiring of Tyler Winters, as a full-time Clerk; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that that this appointment shall take effect on July 8, 2024, and he will be paid in accordance with the CSEA Union Contract.

8. Set Public Hearing for July 25, 2025, to provide for Merger of the Offices of Town Clerk and Receiver of Taxes

(SETTING A PUBLIC HEARING ON A LOCAL LAW CONSOLIDATING THE OFFICE OF RECEIVER OF TAXES WITH THE TOWN CLERKS OFFICE)

WHEREAS, the Town Board has found that several Towns that have merged the office of Town Clerk & Tax Receiver have realized cost savings and efficiencies; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Town Board to hear public comment on the proposal to do the same in East Fishkill; and

WHEREAS, if the Town Board goes forward, the concept would need voter approval at the General Election in November 2024; and

WHEREAS, if approved it would take effect at the end of the current Receivers term; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board will consider a Local Law to consolidate the office of Tax Receiver into the Town Clerks office at its meeting of July 25, 2024 at 6:00 P.M.

Motion to set a Public Hearing for July 25, 2025, to provide for merger of the offices of Town Clerk and Receiver of Taxes: Board Member Flores. Seconded: Board Member Marinaro. All voted in favor. Motion carried.

9. Amend Resolution No. 52/2024 to Adjust Previously Allocated Amount

WHEREAS, the Town Board previously allocated \$35,000.00 and the actual adjusted cost is \$37,000.00; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the budget be adjusted to \$37,000.00.

10. Accept Law Enforcement Technology Grant

(AUTHORIZING DRUG TASK FORCE INTERMUNICIPAL AGREEMENT)

WHEREAS, the Dutchess County District Attorney has previously assisted in establishing the Dutchess County Drug Task Force; and

WHEREAS, the Task Force is comprised of the Police Officers from the various Police Agencies within Dutchess County; and

WHEREAS, the East Fishkill Police Chief has recommended that the Town resume its participation in the Task Force; and

WHEREAS, it would be the responsibility of the Chief to designate an East Fishkill Officer to work with the Task Force; and

WHEREAS, the Chief of Police believes this would be of significant assistance of the Police in the Town of East Fishkill;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board does hereby authorize the utilization of one East Fishkill Police Officer by the Dutchess County Task Force; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Chief of Police shall designate the Officer to be part of the Task Force; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Chief of Police and the Town Supervisor be and hereby are authorized to execute any intermunicipal agreements or other documents necessary to facilitate the intent of this Resolution.

Motion to authorize an Inter-Municipal Agreement with Dutchess County for the Drug Task Force: Board Member Marinaro. Seconded: Board Member Arco. All voted in favor. Motion carried.

Additions to the Agenda by Majority Vote:

Supervisor D'Alessandro stated there were none.

Budget Transfer:

Supervisor D'Alessandro stated there are no budget transfers.

Comments from Town Board Members:

Highway Superintendent Williams stated it was good working with the Police Department and Fire Department during the storms. The roads that were affected during last night's storm are the following: Old Route 52, Judith Drive, Gold Road, Seaman Road, Stormville Road, Bykenhulle Road, Old Sylvan Lake Road, Miller Hill, Sean Drive, Quayle Run, Warren Farm Road, Arcadia Farm Road, the Bykenhulle Pump Station, Harrigan Road, Buroak Drive, Blueberry Lane, Nathan Hale, Innsbruck, Mountain Pass, Collar Bark Road, Christine Court, Ritter Road, Dogwood, Church Street, Dartantra, and Rushmore Road. If they have not been cleaned up yet of debris or branches, they will be back tomorrow. All of the roads are open. There was definitely damage done last night. Supervisor D'Alessandro stated at the height of power outages there were almost 7000 people out last night. There is still approximately 300 people out. Superintendent Williams stated they have continued on pipework on Wonderland Drive, Pells Road, St. Andrews, South Hillside, and Warren Farm. They are doing line striping on Miller Hill, and the Route 52 soccer parking lot, which have been completed. They have been doing easement work on some caved in pipes with help from the Town Engineer on Judith Drive, Southern Drive, Patti Place, and Seamen Road. They have done catch basin repair Newhart Place, Devon Farms, Marge's Way, Shadow Lane Flanders, Cambridge Court, Seward, East Tilden, Clearview Circle, and Rainbow Crest. They have almost everything ready for the paving contractor to start in August. They did meet with him last week. He wanted to thank everyone in the Highway Department and the Recreation Department. When they have large events, everybody comes together as a team and that is what it takes to make it work. He also thanked the Supervisor and the Chief of Police.

Chief Cuccia stated Superintendent Williams and the Highway staff are out as soon as calls start coming in. It does not matter what time of day or night it is, and they do an excellent job. He stated that East Fishkill is the safest place to live in Dutchess County. He reminded residents that crime does happen and to please lock their doors to your house and especially your cars. That is the largest deterrent for robberies. Also do not keep your car keys in the car. He thanked the Board for signing the resolution regarding the Dutchess County Task Force and allowing them to have an officer in that program. It is very beneficial. Aggressive driving details have started. They began in June and will continue through the summer. They did their defense training tactics today and he thanked their liaison Board Member Arco for helping to facilitate that. They will be doing active shooter training, and he would like to thank the Wappinger's Central School District for allowing use of one of their facilities. Dr. Bonk is always there to help. He thanked

Officer Bertoldi for setting up Coffee with a Cop which they did this past month at the Community Center with the local seniors. There was a canine demonstration that was top-notch. He thanked all of the police officers who participated. Tomorrow is graduation for Officer James Clark from the Rockland Police Academy. Supervisor D'Alessandro asked for an update on the Counsel on Addiction Prevention and Education. Chief Cuccia stated every month he has been participating in the Zoom meetings. At East Fishkill's Police Department there is a drug drop-off box, and they are trying to find other facilities to put those into. The meetings are well attended with anywhere from 12 to 18 attendees.

Board Member Arco stated he continues to work with the Highway Superintendent getting the asset management software up and running. They should have it completed by mid-July and using it by the end of July. Every vehicle will be input into the system, and it will be a safe way to track maintenance and reports can be pulled up for what is due for things. It should make the shop more efficient. They have also been working on new truck allocations. There are very long lead times at this point. These do extend beyond the fiscal year so as it is possible to order a truck this year but not receive it until next year. Board member Arco stated he spent a lot of time at the Police Department this month as well. He stated that Officer Bertoldi did an amazing job with the seniors for the Coffee with a Cop. He is a huge asset to the community. This past Monday Board Member Arco did two ride alongs for two different shifts. It was amazing to see how the officers work. This morning, he supervised the tactical training. Police Officer Bruce White did a phenomenal job. He thanked Alex Puzza for use of his gym. He will be attending the graduation tomorrow with Supervisor D'Alessandro.

Board Member Marinaro stated there was a total of 202 EMS calls and 75 fire calls for the month. The fire department participated in a few parades and did receive a trophy for one of the trucks. Some of their members graduated from high school this month. He encourages everyone who has free time to stop by the local fire department and see how they can help. The Fire Department also had an event at Gayhead Elementary on June 14 to allow the students to see the trucks and spray water with the hoses. There is a need for EMS volunteers throughout the County. County Executive Serino is hoping to work with local EMS to address this crisis. There have been meetings with the County and legislators, and this is a nationwide crisis. There is a new County program called the Fly Car Partnership to try to recruit people to join the EMS system. He stated sometimes they receive formal complaints regarding the local farmers. It is important to remember that the farms were here first. He asked that anyone looking to purchase a home take the time to look around the area as well. Everyone needs to live in harmony.

Board Member Franco stated the summer concerts start tomorrow at Hopewell recreation. Concerts are free and the food trucks will be attending there as well. They will advertise which band and food truck will be there on the sign at the Hopewell Recreation Park. It really is a great atmosphere up there on Friday

nights. There is a Fourth of July concert weekend lineup that will include bands and food trucks as well. Fireworks will be Friday at 9:15. Sunday night the band will be at Red Wing Lake. Summer camp started today. Registration can still be done through the Recreation Department. Skateboard lessons will start in the skate park on July 22nd through 26th or August 5th through August 9th. There are two separate sessions to choose from. Women's basketball is up and running and men's basketball starts this week. Coed sand volleyball games start this week and there are still openings if anyone is interested. There are still a few tickets to see The Prom at Forestburgh Playhouse for \$100.00, including lunch. There is the City Field trip for the Mets versus the Red Sox on September 4 for \$100 each. Seats are on the third-base foul line. There are tickets to see the Yankees versus the Angels on August 7 at \$100 a ticket on the third-base foul line. The Saratoga trip is August 15 or \$55 a ticket. To register for any programs or trips you can call the recreation office.

Board Member Flores stated they did record the work that is being done on the Master Plan. They had the June committee meeting. The Chief of Police, the Highway Superintendent, a Fire Commissioner, and the Library Director were all present. It was very informative and eye-opening as to what each department does. There were also a number of special focus meetings to help the committee further define their proposed goals. They had a farm tour. As they develop their plan, they need to ensure that they protect our agriculture. They also have a session with local artists and young professionals last week. One of the topics that came up was a desire to have an improvement made to the aesthetics of Hopewell and the other hamlets. They are discussing what they can do as the town to encourage improving the façades and the signage as well as landscaping and other site improvements within the Hamlet. The July 11 committee meeting has no guest speakers at this time so they will be reviewing the draft chapters. August 29 is the next community public outreach meeting. This will be a very important session and she hopes to see a large number of residents attending. The Assessor advised Board Member Flores that they are filing the Final Assessment Role as of July 1. There will be a copy available at the Town Hall. It will also be online. She thanked the Highway Department for all their work during the storm and afterwards as well. She wanted to wish everyone a happy, safe, and healthy Fourth of July.

Clerk Cassidy wished everyone a happy Fourth of July. He stated there is an American Legion event on the Fourth of July.

Supervisor D'Alessandro wished everyone a happy Fourth of July. There will be a ceremony at the Stout and Charlotte burial ground which is located on East Hook Road. It will be a dedication of a revolutionary soldier's headstone that was redone for Henry Charlock for 1749-1833. The details will be posted on channel 22 and the website. It will be on the Fourth of July at 10 AM. Friday 9:15 PM is the fireworks. Please remember this is the greatest country in the world.
